This year's Nationals also featured the Alligator Alley test pond, giving competitors another resource to fine-tune their setups, one more reason attending Nationals is always a great experience. The Nationals Committee worked tirelessly for over a year, meeting multiple times per month to prepare for this event. It has been an honor to work alongside such dedicated individuals, and I know their efforts have created another unforgettable Nationals. I look forward to sharing more about the event in the next issue of the Propwash.

Summer Safety Corner

Even though we are well into the racing season, a few safety reminders are still relevant. Most of the country has been very hot and sunny this year. Sunburn is common. Use a suitable sunscreen. Hats and body coverings are even better. Heat related problems are serious. Prevention takes covering up, standing in the shade, and drinking lots of water or similar liquids.

The signs of heat exhaustion:

- Feeling faint or dizzy
- Heavy sweating
- Fast, weak pulse
- Nausea or vomiting
- Cold, pale, clammy skin
- Muscle cramps

If any of these are observed, get in a cool shelter and drink lots of water. Call 911 if the condition progresses.

The signs of heatstroke include:

- A body temperature above 103 degrees
- Red, hot, dry or damp skin
- Fast, strong pulse
- Headache
- Nausea or vomiting.
- Losing consciousness

If any of these conditions are observed call 911 and try to cool the person with cold water or ice.

Use caution when launching and retrieving boats. Look at the course for oncoming traffic. The person pictured below could have used a little more care.



Fires pose another potential for serious injury. Familiarity as well as proper charging with modern battery chargers has largely eliminated lithium polymer battery fires. Lots of water to cool the battery or sand to smother the fire is the proper response if one happens. Gasoline is much more flammable than methanol and nitromethane. Please be very careful around gasoline cans and don't smoke around either gasoline or other fuel. Use the right dry chemical extinguisher for a gasoline fire. Since gasoline floats, water will only spread a gasoline fire.

Save the adult beverages for after the racing. Be especially careful when celebrating with these guys.



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It's easy to keep model boating a safe hobby. We all know how. Just keep reminding others when they have a lapse in judgment. It's everyone's job. Unlike this guy, keep your mind open.



Spring Proposal Voting


Back in April of 2025, the membership voted on two proposals.

- 1. Superboat Rules for Gas.
- Modifications to the G Class engines in Section 27 of the NAMBA rule book.

Both have passed and you can view the rule book updates on the NAMBA web site.

25.8 % of the NAMBA membership voted with 88.1% of those who voted, were in favor of the passing of the two proposals.

If you run Gas powered boats, it would be to your best interest to follow up on the latest rule changes.


Many attended Greg Hill's Celebration of Life. This picture is a small sample size of the number of model boaters who traveled from Arizona, California, Colorado, and Montana.

Stay on Top of Your Schedule with MyFeed

Drivers will no longer need to chase down paper printouts or listen for class calls over the PA.

With MyFeed, every driver gets a personalized schedule right on their phone, showing their classes, heat orders, and standings in real time. MyFeed also allows drivers to scratch themselves from heats without having to track down the CD.

Follow the Action with LiveFeed

Whether you're a competitor, spectator, or pit crew, LiveFeed keeps everyone connected to the race. Accessible from any web browser, LiveFeed displays live scores, current heat progress, and standings. At Nationals, it will also be running in Kiosk Mode on big screens around the site so the whole crowd can follow the action.

Smarter Event Check-Ins

This year's name tags come with built-in barcodes linked to RES. Drivers who purchased tickets for social events like the Welcome Dinner, Paddle Boat Race, or Awards Banquet will simply scan their badge for fast, paperless entry. This is just the start of what RES will bring to event access and member validation in the future.

Seamless Race Operations

Behind the scenes, RES is helping contest directors keep Nationals running smoothly. From heat setup and scoring to tracking scratches and resolving issues, the system reduces manual work and ensures accurate, transparent results. The time saved on paperwork is time given back to racing.

Download the Latest App

Just before Nationals begins, make sure you download or update to the latest version of the RES Mobile app from the Apple App Store or Google Play. This ensures you'll have access to all the newest features during the event.

Bring Your Phone

Use MyFeed to check your heats, standings, and schedules any-time.

Watch the Screens

LiveFeed will be running in kiosk mode on big displays around the site so you never miss the action.

Keep Your Badge Handy

Your Nationals name tag includes a barcode. Use it to check in at social events like the

Welcome Dinner, Paddle Boat Race, and Awards Banquet.

Scratch with Ease

Can't make a heat? Use MyFeed to scratch yourself directly without chasing down the CD.

Smart Name Tags

New Look for Nationals: Smart Name Tags Powered by RES

At the 2025 NAMBA Nationals, competitors and attendees will notice something new hanging around their necks, redesigned, feature-rich name tags generated directly from the NAMBA Race Entry System (RES). While they may look like a simple badge at first glance, these name tags are packed with functionality that makes them one of the most useful additions to Nationals in years.

NAMBA Number Front and Center

As required by the NAMBA rulebook, the member's NAMBA number is prominently displayed at the top center of the badge. This makes it easy for race officials and fellow drivers to identify competitors quickly on and off the course.

Personalized Driver Information

Directly beneath the number, each badge highlights the driver's name, along with their city and state. This small detail fosters community by helping participants put names to faces and connect drivers with their regional roots.

Sponsor Recognition

Many badges will proudly display a sponsor designation, such as Platinum Sponsor, right on the tag. This not only gives well deserved recognition to sponsors but also ties them visually into the event experience.

Barcode for Check-Ins and Events

NAMBA Records

Greetings fellow racers.

NAMBA is now using the new (RES) system for timing of their heat races. Some districts have been using the system for heat races and the times are showing good results.

In April of this year, the Wavemasters RC club from District 9 put on a heat race at Kaiser Cove, Fremont California. On Saturday Alan Terry, NAMBA Gas Chairman laid down a time of 82.02 seconds in G-1 Mono. He has that new Assault mono hauling the mail.

On Sunday Joe Slaney with his Blazer P Sport Hydro turned in a 65.92 second heat. A few heats later, Jesse Alvitre with his Blazer Backlash put down a blazing 62.14 second heat. That is the fastest 6 lap time on the books. Congratulations to everyone at that race.

I am hoping more districts will start keeping more heat racing times so we can get more NAMBA heat racing records.



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The same weekend we were holding NAMBA Time Trials in Huntsville, Alabama. Jim Johnson came down from Virginia and brought his new P Limited Sport Hydro. After a few test runs and prop changes he ran a two way average of 92.78 miles per hour.

Brent Byers drove up from Texas and brought his new design P Sport Hydro. After a little tweeking he made a two way average of 99.60 miles per hour. He later made some passes over 100 but was unable to back them up.

In July we had a one day event however the weather was not in our favor. We did have some unbelievable one way passes from Jim Johnson with his P Limited Tunnel at over 92 miles per hour and his P Sport Hydro running 112 miles per hour.

Bob Londress came out with his brand new G-Limited Catamaran. After a few adjustments and prop changes he had it running really well. In SAW (Straight-A-Way) he ran a two way average of 50.69 miles per hour. And in 2-Lap Oval he started in the 40 second range and kept at it until he drove a really great time of 31.564 seconds.

Our next NAMBA Time Trials will be November 30 and December 1 in Huntsville, Alabama.



Gas Engines Part 1


Gas power dominates our racing today. These articles will be a review of what it takes to build a race winning engine. First some history and basic two stroke principles.

Two stroke engines have fascinated engineers since they were invented by Dugald Clerk in 1881. The promise of one power stroke per revolution was counter acted by the need to charge the cylinder with an outside system. Many elaborate schemes have been devised to solve this problem. DKW motorcycle engines illustrate successful, but complex, approaches to the problem. There is another way. In 1889 Joseph Day invented a valveless, two stroke engine that used the crankcase as the scavenging pump. This engine was largely overlooked for high power and was used where low cost, light weight, and simplicity were critical. Outboard engines, chain saws, and inexpensive motorcycles were some of the main applications. However, in the ruins of East Germany after World War II, this simple engine was reborn.

The East German government was interested in proving the superiority of their sportsmen and, in 1953, promoted Walter Kaaden to head of the racing department of MZ (Motorradwerk Zschopau) motorcycles in East Germany. Eventually the East German government was interested in proving the superiority of their sportsmen and, in 1953, promoted Walter Kaaden to head of the racing department of MZ (Motorradwerk Zschopau) motorcycles in East Germany. However, he had the rich, German two stroke history (his father was a chauffeur at the DKW factory) and he had worked as an engineer on the V 1 cruise missile.

Eventually Suzuki 50 cc, 2 cylinder two strokes developed 17.5 hp at 17,300 rpm or 350 hp per liter. Their outlawed 3 cylinder, 50 cc RP8 developed 19 hp at 20,000 rpm.

One of the big problems in a two stroke is getting the exhaust out and the new mixture in. A four stroke uses a full stroke of the piston as a positive pump to do this for both the intake and exhaust. The two stroke depends on pressure differences to do this in less than ½ of the piston stroke. In the Late 1960s and 1970s Dr. Gordon Blair at the Queens University in Belfast did a test program for Yamaha on two stroke design. Like Kaaden, he understood that flow in an engine was caused by the resonate effects between the various engine parts.

He used this to develop a computer power prediction program. A refined version of this program is available as EngMod2T. He also developed a method to test scavenging efficiency. From this and dyno testing he found the scavenging effectiveness of various transfer passage shapes. The best (cylinder 14) and worst (cylinder 12) of these are shown below. These days even better designs have been developed.







Fig. 3.6 QUB single cycle gas scavenging apparatus.




Blair's worst #12 and best #14 transfer designs






Aprilia transfer plan section




Aprilia transfers horizontal section

The idea is that the transfer design directs the fresh mixture away from the exhaust port, up the back of the cylinder, and over the top of the cylinder pushing the exhaust gas ahead of it. This happens around bottom dead center when the transfers are fully open and the tuned pipe is producing low pressure at the exhaust port. The one component responsible for at least half the power of our engines is the tuned exhaust system. The way the system does this is by creating high and low pressure pulses that are timed to the engines porting. Dropping the pressure in the cylinder while the transfer ports are open encourages flow into the cylinder while increasing the cylinder pressure just before the exhaust port closes supercharges the cylinder. Our open transfers are a lot less efficient at directing flow. However, our tuned pipes still work well as the graph below shows. EPO is exhaust port opening, TPO is transfer port opening, TPC is transfer port closing, EPC is exhaust port closing, and IPO is intake port opening. The supercharge is equal to 13 to 14 psi boost

depending on rpm. Future articles will look at tuned pipe design, Zenoah porting, dyno testing, and the nature of "gasoline".






